




Cruisin' at the 2008 Hatfield Reunion

Opal Stafford Hatfield, who turned 100 on January 7, 2009, was honored at parties in Georgetown, Indiana, and Cincinnati, Ohio.


















Devastation in Pike County

This scene in Belfry, Kentucky, is indicative of how bad the flooding has been this spring. Pike County is one of the counties determined by FEMA to be a disaster area, allowing some additional federal assistance. Not only were the early June floods bad, but subsequent rains caused additional flooding making clean-up really difficult. Sheryle Sullivan reports that:

There are five bridges gone on Blackberry Fork. The roads are broken off in some places to one lane. Up Forest Hills, the road is really bad. Four bridges are gone or damaged there. Belfry Floral, Rogers Funeral Home and Hatfield Funeral Home all had major damage. I don't know if they are putting Belfry Floral back in. Rogers and Hatfield's are holding their funeral services in area churches. They are working on Belfry Middle school and hope to have it ready before school starts. If not, the kids will be sent to different area schools.

The Southside Mall, which is managed by Sheryle, provided food for Brianna Sullivan and some of her middle school friends to run a kitchen. From their kitchen in the Belfry firehouse, they fed people for five days.
